WELCOME TO ST LEONARD'S SIXTH FORM

I would like to offer you a warm welcome to St Leonard's Sixth Form and thank you for your interest. We look forward to being able to show you round the Martyrs' Building and giving you a taste of the energy, ambition and friendly atmosphere which exists in the close-knit community of our Sixth Form. I hope this evening will be a chance for you to talk to our staff about the different opportunities students will have in studying A Levels and BTEC subjects and, perhaps even more importantly, a chance to discuss with our current Year 12 and Year 13 students their experiences of being in the Sixth Form.

Bridging the gap between GCSE and the Sixth Form is challenging for students in any year but was particularly difficult this year with Year 11 having had such disrupted GCSE years. We were very proud of the support that we were able to offer both internal and external students through our first Bridging Week in school, which took place in June, and gave students a taster of the subjects they were interested in. The week enabled students to experience lessons in the Sixth Form and ask questions about courses and the different requirements for both A Levels and BTEC. It was also a chance for students to explore the supercurricular opportunities available in different subjects. The response from students to Bridging Week was superb and the very positive feedback from teachers to the pre-course material submitted this September clearly demonstrates that Year 12 are well on the way to making the transition to bridging the gap and becoming independent learners.

Our immediate response to schools being closed has informed and developed our teaching and provision for all students. When Lockdown was announced in March 2020 A Level lessons were delivered 'live' online via MS Teams and both students and staff commented on the success of these lessons. Currently, when there are students who have to self-isolate, we are offering blended learning with lessons being broadcast 'live' to ensure that anybody unable to come to school is not missing out.

We hope that you find the evening useful and informative and that it provides a flavour of the pastoral support we offer to ensure that all students achieve their full potential. For our students, we want their experience of Sixth Form at St Leonard's to be the springboard to future success at university, through an apprenticeship or in the world of work. We are proud of the achievements of our past students and look forward to hearing of all you will come to achieve after your time here.

STUDYING IN THE SIXTH FORM

Most students at St Leonard's will either study 3 A Level subjects or a BTEC Extended Diploma though there is the opportunity to add a fourth A Level or to combine a BTEC course with one A Level. Details of the entry requirements for these courses can be found on the school website. The best advice to give to all Year 11 students as they consider their choices is to work as hard as they can during this important year to leave lots of options open. The Sixth Form Library is an excellent working environment to help students to develop the independent study skills necessary to excel in the Sixth Form.

The general rule for Sixth Form students is to match every hour of teaching time with an hour of independent study. The work Sixth Form students complete outside of the classroom to secure their understanding of learning in lessons is perhaps the most important factor in students achieving success. Establishing this work ethic from the start, with the knowledge that teachers and departments are there to support and intervene when things get difficult, has helped our students achieve excellent results.

There have been many challenges in trying to support students during a global pandemic but the adaptations we have made at St Leonard's have also provided lots of opportunities to help Sixth Form students in different ways. Alongside the very successful teaching that took place through Teams, the creation of individual 'Teams' for year group, tutor group and individual subjects and classes has enabled teachers to share resources and provided a very easy way for students to make contact with teachers and receive individual support.

We also had fantastic support from ex-students through the year, including a Q and A session as part of a Creativity Day in February which Year 12 students found very helpful. There was also one-on-one online tutoring provide where requested and individual help pairing ex-students with Year 13 students aiming for a similar university or career choice. Another opportunity that emerged because of Lockdown was the number of super-curricular resources that became available free of charge and we were able to direct students to online resources such as Massolit, which the school now has a subscription for.

Finally, alongside the support that is given to students by teachers there is the opportunity for students to receive additional free tutoring from Durham University through Castle Community Action and ZeroGravity, two groups where current Durham University students have been running online subject tutorials and mentoring for students who have requested extra help.

PROFILE OF A ST LEONARD'S SIXTH FORM STUDENT

By the end of their time in St Leonard's Sixth Form it is hoped that young people are:

- developing and deepening a relationship with God, and are able to find God in reflection on their own experience.
- happy, friendly, and self-confident, with a sense of humour and an awareness of their gifts and the need to fulfil their potential for good.
- seen to have a generosity of spirit and a readiness to place their talents at the disposal of others, especially those most in need.
- well prepared to take their place in wider society unmotivated by prestige or selfish ambition and aware of how fully they can contribute to the common good.
- ready to ask 'What more can I do, what more can I give?' in every area of life.
- proud of having belonged to a Catholic school community with respect for its values and those who taught them.

SUBJECT OVERVIEW

Our Sixth Form offers a wide range of subjects and we are always looking to expand that provision. Following consultations with students, parents and

departments, we will be considering other subjects we may be able to offer in addition to the list overleaf. In the past we have had fixed option blocks, but in order to cater for individual choices, we will be shaping our option blocks around the individual needs of students after the application deadline on Friday 5th November to enable as many students as possible to study their chosen combination of subjects.

Since the examination governing bodies moved from AS and A2 (where there were examinations in both Year 12 and Year 13) to a linear A Level (where all examinations take place at the end of Year 13) we, like many schools, have advised the majority of students to study 3 A Levels. There are a number of reasons for this, but the demanding workload in the new specifications and the fact that no university will make an offer for more than 3 A Levels are the major factors. There is an exception to this for students who might want to study Further Mathematics alongside Mathematics and Science subjects and also for some students applying to the most competitive universities. There are also some students who find it difficult to decide on 3 A Level subjects and so initially start with 4 for a trial period before deciding which 3 subjects they will continue with into Year 13. In the summer term of Year 12, students are invited to sign up to complete an Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) which is worth half an A Level and is an excellent way for students to develop their independent study skills.

Typically, students will be required to achieve a minimum of a GCSE Grade 6 in each of the subjects they wish to study at A Level, but Grade 5 in some arts and humanities subjects. We set this entry criteria based on previous students' final performance over a number of years to try to ensure that students do not embark on a course to which they are not suited. For BTEC Level 3 students the entry requirement is a minimum of 4 GCSE Grade 4s or BTEC Level 2 equivalents. However, there are students who have met the A Level entry but decide that they are better suited to the modular element of the BTEC course. Any student who does not achieve a Grade 4 for either Maths or English will have the opportunity to study and re-sit alongside their other courses.

It is the quality and dedication of the teaching in St Leonard's Sixth Form which we are most proud of. Together with small class sizes, this facilitates expert individual support for every student to enable each individual to achieve what he or she is capable of.

NEXT STEPS

At St. Leonard's Sixth Form we take great pride in the support we offer to provide a clear pathway for students leaving the school. In the first term of Year 12 students are asked to give an indication of areas of study and work they would like to go in to. This is used to ensure each individual student has considered what is necessary for the course or career they want to pursue. This is followed up with a 'Life Beyond St. Leonard's' evening for students and parents to outline opportunities available to students after leaving school and to introduce the university application process (UCAS); this session ran very successfully online last year and plans are in place to do the same this year.

In Year 12 students have a number of tutor sessions that focus on what they will do after Sixth Form, including sessions where they are paired with their parallel Year 13 tutor group and have the chance to benefit from their experiences of applying to university or for an apprenticeship. In the summer term of Year 12, students have 2 days off timetable to consider the possibilities available to them after leaving school. Labelled 'GRIT' (Get Ready It's Time), speakers from universities, industry and local business provide students with advice and help students begin to prepare themselves for UCAS. For the second time this year these sessions ran successfully on MS Teams with students together in school listening to external speakers. There was again very positive feedback both from students and from the speakers themselves.

Pastoral time in the first term of Year 13 is spent writing Personal Statements and completing UCAS forms, with tutors offering support in every session. Through the drafting of Personal Statements, individual guidance is given to ensure that students are able to create a competitive application and all forms are checked by the Head of Year before being sent off. Support with Admissions' Tests for early entry candidates and mock interviews are also both provided to ensure students are fully prepared.

While the majority of students in our Year 13 cohorts move on to take up university places all over the country, including Oxford, Cambridge and other Russell Group universities, we also have a number students who take up apprenticeship opportunities. The number and type of apprenticeships has increased recently, with many schemes able to offer an undergraduate degree as part of the programme. Support is also provided for students applying for an apprenticeship and we have excellent support from Kathryn Smith, an Apprenticeship Advisor at ASK who has been able to offer information, advice and guidance to students who have expressed an interest in applying for an apprenticeship.
